FROM THE PASTORS DESK **Good Use of a Holiday**

Dear Brothers and Sisters of St. Anthony's,

I hope you enjoyed the time off the other day. It is always good to have time to do something different than the normal. "rush out the door" experience of daily life. It is also good to do something that builds you up. Sometimes we can use available time to do things that are less than constructive. Chock it up to human nature; remember one of the seven deadly sins is Sloth.

On the day that we celebrate the legacy of Doctor Martin Luther King, I always do two things. First, I listen to the speech that Dr. King gave in Washington, DC on August 28th, 1963. It's the "I Have a Dream" speech. I am sure most are familiar with it. The second thing I do is to read the Letter to Fellow clergy from the jail house in Birmingham, Alabama. These two things remind me that this all comes from a fellow believer in Jesus Christ and that there is still much work still to be done in human relationships. Due to the effects of original sin that task is never complete.

Years ago, when I was attempting to keep a Catholic school open in the parish that I was assigned, I had to do some things that were out of the ordinary. I had to come up with a strategy that would attract parents and children to our school; to do something unique that no one else was doing. I gathered parents and stake-holders of the school and we came up with the idea of a "classical model" for learning. We thought of people who benefitted from this type of learning model. One such person was Dr. Martin Luther King.

When you read, "Letter from a Birmingham Jail", you can see the evidence of King's classical education. While the letter is five pages and more, and can't be reproduced, here in my article I will give you a taste of the letter, but would encourage you to read it in its entirety. It's a classic that Dr. King writes:

"There was a time when the Church was very powerful. It was during that period that the early Christians rejoiced when they were deemed worthy to suffer for what they believed. In those days the Church was not merely a thermometer that recorded the ideas and principles of popular opinion; it was that thermostat that transformed the mores of society. Wherever the early Christians entered a town, the power structure got disturbed and immediately sought to convict them of being "disturbers of the peace" and outside agitator. But they went on with the conviction that they were "a colony of heaven" and they had to obey God rather than men. They were small in number but big in commitment. They were God-intoxicated to be astronomically intimidated. They brought an end to such ancient evils as infanticide and gladiatorial contests"....

...."But the judgement of God is upon the Church as never before. If the Church of today does not recapture the sacrificial spirit of the early Church, it will lose its authentic ring, forfeit the loyalty of millions, and be dismissed as an irrelevant social club with no meaning for the twentieth century. I meet young people every day whose disappointment with the Church has risen to outright disgust. I hope the Church will meet the challenge of the decisive hour..."

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME **JANUARY 28TH, 2018**

First Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

Moses explains to the people that a prophet will come from among them, and that they should listen to this prophet’s words, for God has told him of this prophet. God also tells Moses that anyone who pretends to speak in his words, or speaks in the name of other gods shall die.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 7:32-35

Paul tells the Corinthians how an unmarried man or woman is able to devote themselves fully to God without concern for the needs of a spouse. Paul explains that God wants to help them promote good and devote themselves more fully to God.

Gospel: Mark 1:21-28

As Jesus was teaching, a man with an unclean spirit came to destroy them. Jesus ordered the spirit out of the man, who shrieked violently as the spirit departed. The people were amazed at the authority he had over the spirit.
