FROM THE PASTORS DESK

Palm Sunday in Year B: Mark’s Passion

Dear Brothers and Sisters of St. Anthony’s,

Today as I write, the Church through the world is celebrating the Feast of St. Joseph. This feast concentrates on the fact that Joseph was the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus. In May, we will celebrate another feast of St. Joseph, in which we will concentrate more on his vocation as a “Working Man”.

We also celebrated, just a few days ago, the feast of St. Patrick. The month of March, in which Lent falls, always has some wonderful feast days in which we can celebrate the lives of these Holy People. March 25th is also the celebration of the Annunciation, which this year falls in Holy Week and is transferred to another day, April 9th.

This Sunday finds us blessing palm branches and waving them triumphantly as we celebrate Palm Sunday. We recall that moment when Jesus entered the city of Jerusalem amidst the cries of the people proclaiming him to be the Messiah of the Son of David. These same people, in just a few short days will be crying out another, very different chant. They will cry out; “Crucify Him.” Oh, the fickleness of the human heart. We are not very different from them.

We will bless palm branches and we will also listen to the Holy Passion of Jesus Christ according to Mark. Mark is the evangelist that pulls no punches. His crucifixion scene in the Gospel is blunt and to the point. Mark’s gospel was addressed to the Church around the year 60 AD. It was a church struggling to get its foundations established. The Apostles were having a difficult time spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ. Many of them were sacrificing their very lives as a result of their proclamation. Mark, the Evangelist, was aware of this. He was the mouthpiece of St. Peter, who was crucified in Rome on an upside down cross. St. Paul wasn’t far behind. Mark’s passion reflects this time by having Jesus saying only one thing from the cross. That is: “My God, My God,...Why have you forsaken me.”

The other Gospels tell us more of what Jesus uttered from the cross. And while it may have fit into the Gospel scenario, Mark gives us a Jesus who is utterly destitute and stripped of everything; even the intimacy of the Father’s love. Jesus hangs from the cross in great sorrow with darkness engulfing him. He asks; Where are You Heavenly Father?

During life there will be times when we will identify with each of the Evangelists depictions of the crucified Jesus. I have found much hope in the portrait that St. Mark paints of the crucified Jesus. Even though his crucifixion scene is cold, bleak, and dark, it doesn’t end there. There is the Resurrection, but that doesn’t mean that we will not encounter hardship in this world. It is a Gospel of Hope.

EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION THE LORD: APRIL 1ST, 2018

First Reading: Acts 10:34a, 37-43

Peter discusses Jesus’ life of preaching and healing. Jesus was crucified, then he rose up and was seen by his chosen witnesses. Peter also mentions the importance of all the disciples bearing witness to what they saw, so that many people would believe in Jesus, and have their sins forgiven through him.

Second Reading: Colossians 3:1-4

Paul asserts that we must pay attention to higher realms, rather than earthly concerns. Our life is not yet completely known to us, until Christ appears and we are raised to glory in him.

Gospel: John 20:1-9

When Mary Magdalene discovered Jesus’ tomb was open, she told Simon Peter and another disciple. They ran to the tomb and Peter went inside. He found the burial wrappings on the ground, with the head covering separate from the rest. The other disciple came in and they believed what they saw, although until then they had not understood the Scripture’s message of Jesus’ resurrection.
